



Israeli Genocide in Gaza Situation Report (No. 30)

on the Israeli Aggression on Gaza

Covers the period from 5th to 14th March 2024



Introduction

The Israeli bombardment of the Gaza Strip has turned a large part of the besieged Palestinian enclave into a pile of rubble, with people in desperate need of water, fuel and life-saving necessities, amid a total blockade of the enclave. Thousands of buildings, including hospitals, mosques and churches, have also been damaged or destroyed in Israel's relentless air and ground attacks on the besieged enclave.

This report (No. 30), available in English and Arabic, provides daily facts and statistics about Israeli massacres in the Gaza Strip in the period between March 05 and March 14, 2024.

It also sheds light on the political and humanitarian aftermaths along with the material and human loss inflicted on the besieged enclave as a result of the unabated strikes and Israeli siege, impeding Gazans' access to humanitarian assistance.



1. Daily Scenes

■ Tuesday, March 05

Israeli attacks have claimed the lives of more than 110 people and left more than 160 others injured. Earlier, in the morning, the Gaza-based Health Ministry announced the death of 97 people and the injury of 123 others following nine massacres committed by the Israeli army in just a few hours. The death toll from Israeli offensives on Gaza since Oct. 7 has climbed to 30,631 and the injured to 72,043. 16 people have been pronounced dead after Israeli artilleries shelled a house near the European Hospital, between Rafah and Khan Younis cities. An Israeli air attack on a home in Khan Younis in southern Gaza killed at least eight people.





Journalist Mohamed Salama, broadcaster on Al-Aqsa satellite channel was killed in the bombing of a house in the city of Deir al-Balah, the Government Media Office has said. The number of journalist killed in Gaza since the war began on October 7 has increased to 133.

NetBlocks says there was a notably “high impact” to connectivity in southern Gaza: “The incident will be experienced as a near-total telecommunications outage by many residents, after months of overall decline since the start of the war”.



A Palestinian child was shot dead by Israeli soldiers in Huwara town, in the occupied West Bank city of Nablus. Eighteen-year-old Nour al-Din Ibrahim Yassin succumbed to wounds he sustained on Feb. 29 in Jenin city. The West Bank’s death toll since Oct. 7 has reached 432 and the injured 4,660.

Wednesday, March 6

Israeli attacks have killed 100 people and left 130 others injured. In its morning briefing, the Gaza Health Ministry reported the death of 86 people and the injury of 113 others following nine Israeli massacres. The death toll since Oct. 7 has increased to 30,717 and the injured to 72,156.

Israeli air strikes targeted a school-turned-shelter east of Rafah, resulting in deaths and injuries. At least five people have been killed and nine injured as Israeli forces attacked a group of civilians gathering for aid collection near Al-Kuwait roundabout, south of Gaza city. Twelve have been killed in Israeli strikes on Nuseirat and Deir El-Balah.



Palestinian journalist Muhammad Salama has been killed with his family in an Israeli air raid on his home in the city of Deir El-Balah, according to the Gaza Media Office. At least five people were killed in Israeli bombing of a mosque in north Gaza.

Civil defense crews rushed to the scene to begin rescue efforts, and recovered the bodies of at least five Palestinians, as well as many wounded. Children were among the injured. A 15-year-old child died at al-Shifa Hospital and a 72-year-old man died at Kamal Adwan Hospital in northern Gaza, as a result of malnutrition and dehydration, Gaza Health Ministry spokesman Ashraf al-Qudra says in a statement.



This brings the official death toll of those who have succumbed to malnutrition and dehydration to 20. Al-Qudra emphasised that the announced death toll only reflects cases that have reached hospitals: “We believe that dozens are dying silently as a result of starvation without reaching hospitals”.

South Africa has asked the International Court of Justice to order additional emergency measures against Israel, which it says is breaching the measures already in place, citing imminent widespread famine in Gaza.

Israeli forces shot and killed a Palestinian man during a military incursion into Burin village, in Nablus, in the northern occupied West Bank. The death toll has reached 424 and the injured 4,670.



Thursday, March 07

Israeli occupation forces killed 95 people and left 150 injured. In its morning briefing, the Gaza Health Ministry said 83 people have been killed and 83 injured in nine Israeli massacres across the enclave. The death toll has reached 30,800 and the injured 72,298. Five people have been pronounced dead in an Israeli strike targeting civilian homes near Gaza's European Hospital.

Israeli forces fired live rounds at a group of Palestinians lining up for humanitarian aid at the Nabulsi roundabout, resulting in casualties. The European Union's foreign policy chief has called for more "pressure" on Israel to grant unimpeded access to humanitarian aid in Gaza.



Friday, March 8

Israeli air and ground attacks have claimed the lives of 110 people and left nearly 200 injured. In its morning briefing, the Health Ministry reported the death of 78 people and the injury of 104 in eight Israeli massacres. The death toll has gone up as high as 30,878 and the injured 72,402. Five people in Gaza are killed by airdropped aid boxes after parachutes failed to open.

Several have been wounded in Israeli attack near Khan Younis. The injured were taken to the European Gaza Hospital after Israeli forces targeted a car in al-Thawabta neighbourhood, south of Khan Younis. Video shared on social media shows the wounded lying on the hospital's floor as medical workers attended to their injuries.



Three more children died of malnutrition and dehydration at Gaza City's Al-Shifa Hospital. It brings the official death toll from malnutrition and dehydration in Gaza hospitals to 23. The number only reflects the confirmed cases that have reached hospitals. The ministry previously said "dozens" more are silently dying of starvation imposed on them by the Israeli military.

At least two civilians have been shot dead by Israeli occupation forces as they lined up for aid at the Nabulsi roundabout, in Gaza city.



A Palestinian man was killed by Israeli soldiers following a military incursion into the village of Silat Al-Harithiya, in Jenin, bringing the West Bank's death toll since Oct. 7 to 425 and the injured to 4,687.

Saturday, March 9

PRC has documented the death of at least 105 people and the injury of nearly 150 as Israeli attacks have gone unabated. In its morning briefing, the Gaza Health Ministry announced the death of 82 people and the injury of 122 following 10 Israeli massacres, bringing the death toll since Oct. 7 to 30,960 and the injured to 72,524.

An infant and young woman have died from malnutrition and dehydration in northern Gaza with an estimated 300,000 people there facing famine as Israel prevents aid distribution. The deaths have increased the number of known starvation deaths to 25.



Israeli forces struck the 12-floor Burj Al-Masri building, one of the largest residential towers in Rafah, early on Saturday morning, forcing hundreds of Palestinians to flee. The mayor of Jabalia, in the northern Gaza Strip, said three in four wells there have been destroyed by the Israeli army.

Sunday, March 10

Up until Sunday evening, nearly 100 people have been reported dead and 140 injured in Israeli air strikes and ground attacks across the besieged enclave. In its morning update, the Gaza-based Health Ministry said 85 people have been killed and 130 injured following eight Israeli massacres committed in recent hours. The death toll has gone up as high as 31,045 and the injured 72,654. At least 13 people have been killed as Israeli artilleries shelled makeshift tents set up for the displaced in Khan Younis city.





The Ministry of Health in Gaza said exhausted medical personnel in the northern Strip continue to work around the clock but are under immense physical pressure as there is nothing to eat. More than 2,000 medical personnel working in northern Gaza will begin their Ramadan without having anything to eat for suhoor or iftar, it said.

Monday, March 11



Up until Monday evening, 70 deaths and 110 injuries have been reported. In its morning briefing, the Health Ministry said 67 people have been killed and 106 injured in seven Israeli massacres committed over the past few hours.

On the 157th day of the Israeli genocide, the number of victims has reached 31,112 and the injured 72,760. Deaths and injuries have been reported as Israeli forces fired live rounds at a group of people seeking life-saving humanitarian aid near the Kuwait roundabout, on Salah Al-Deen Street, southeast of Gaza city.



An Israeli special force boarding a civilian car shot and killed a Palestinian man while he was inside a store in Zeita, north of the occupied West Bank of Tulkarem. He is a resident of Arraba town, south of Jenin city. The incident brought the West Bank's death toll since Oct. 7 to 426 and the injured to 4,697.

Tuesday, March 12

At least 85 people have been reported killed and nearly 180 injured up until Tuesday evening. In its morning briefing, the Gaza Health Ministry reported 72 deaths and 129 injuries following eight Israeli massacres. The death toll has hit 31,184 and the injured 72,889.

An Israeli military attack on humanitarian aid seekers south of Gaza city has taken away the lives of seven people and left 20 injured. Gaza's media office said more than 400 Palestinians were killed by Israeli fire while waiting for aid since the "flour massacre" in late February. Israeli warplanes have escalated bombardment of residential towers in Hamad city, to the south, razing scores of apartments completely to the ground.

Videos shared online by Palestinian journalists show the destruction of a residential home belonging to the Al-Atrash family in the city of Deir El-Balah. Debris and concrete can be seen strewn all over the street as people search frantically for survivors. Other footage shared online shows those killed and wounded in the Israeli raid, including children, being brought to the Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital.





Israeli forces shot dead three Palestinians, including a minor from Jerusalem's Shu'fat refugee camp, bringing the West Bank's death toll since Oct. 7 to 429. The minor was identified as Rami Hamdan Al-Halhuli, 13.

Wednesday, March 13



PRC has documented more than 100 deaths and 150 injuries up until Wednesday evening. In its morning update, the Gaza Health Ministry reported 10 Israeli massacres, claiming the lives of 88 people and leaving 135 injured. The death toll has increased to 31,272 and the injured to 73,024.



Israeli artilleries shelled the vicinities of the Quds Hospital, run by the Palestinian Red Crescent Society in Tel-AlHawa, killing five people and wounding several others. Casualties have been reported among the displaced in Al-Mawasi, in Khan Younis city after Israeli artillery shelled tents for the displaced west of Hamad Town.

Once again, Israeli forces targeted civilians awaiting humanitarian aid at the Kuwait roundabout, in Gaza city. Six deaths and 83 injuries have been reported. An Israeli attack hit a UN aid distribution centre in Rafah, killing at least one UNRWA staff member and wounding more than 20 others.



An unpublished report by UNRWA details the extensive use of torture against Palestinians taken prisoner by the Israeli military in Gaza, including 21 agency staff members and 15 family members of UNRWA staff.

Palestinians named a street in Jericho after Aaron Bushnell - the US airman who died after setting himself on fire to protest Israel's war on Gaza. Israeli occupation soldiers fatally gunned down three Palestinians in the West Bank cities of Jenin and Bethlehem, bringing the West Bank's death toll to 432.

Thursday, March 14

Up until Thursday evening, 88 deaths and 135 injuries have been reported. In its morning update, the Gaza Health Ministry said 69 people have been killed and 110 injured in seven Israeli massacres. The enclave's death toll has climbed to 31,341 and the injured to 73,134.



Once again, Israeli army unleashed live fire at civilians seeking humanitarian aid near the Kuwait roundabout, in Gaza city. The attack has killed at least 21 and injured more than 150. 20 dead Palestinians and 155 injuries have reached Al-Shifa Hospital in Gaza City: "The wounded lie on the floor in al-Shifa Medical Complex," the Health Ministry said in a statement, adding that medical teams are unable to deal with the volume and nature of the injuries due to weakened medical capabilities.



2. Humanitarian and Political Repercussions



MIFTAH, the Palestinian Initiatives for the Promotion of Global Dialogue and Democracy, has said that the footage of Israeli soldiers rifling through women’s undergarments in Gaza is “an integral part of genocide”. It is “a key example of [soldiers’] depravity” and shows that they can carry out crimes with “impunity”, the Palestinian women-focused NGO says.



Several videos and images have surfaced in recent weeks on social media platforms of Israeli forces wearing or stealing women's undergarments. These incidents, the non-profit says, are part of the "fetishisation" of Palestinian women by Israeli soldiers who often hold on to these pieces of clothing "like trophies": "These photos are one of the many components of Israel's attempted psychological domination over Gaza, in which the Palestinian man is emasculated and the Palestinian woman is conquered," MIFTAH said.

Riyad Mansour, Palestine's envoy to the UN, has reminded the Security Council that not a single meeting has been held on evidence found over many years by the UN on sexual violence committed by Israelis against Palestinians. He said he hopes an unbiased approach will replace this trend from now on and pointed to gaps in the special rapporteur's work.

While Rapporteur Pramila Patten's report did not go into details since existing UN evidence points to sexual violence being committed against Palestinians in the occupied West Bank, she did not invite any of those entities to present evidence on Monday in New York. "Let the facts speak; let the law decide," he said, pointing out that Israel has flat-out refused to cooperate with many UN fact-finding missions and rights inquiries over the years in "its failed attempt to hide the truth".

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has called Israeli attacks on Gaza one of century's 'greatest barbarities', saying the war is taking place with unlimited support from Western powers: "For the past 151 days, we have been witnessing one of the greatest barbarities of the last century," Erdogan said in a joint news conference with his Palestinian counterpart Mahmoud Abbas in the Turkish capital Ankara.

He accused the government of Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of committing "blatant genocide against Palestinians": "Netanyahu and his accomplices in murder will surely be held accountable for every drop of blood spilled before the law and public conscience," the Turkish leader said.

Iran minister called for Israel's expulsion from UN General Assembly. This came at a meeting of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia. Iran's Foreign Minister Amir Abdollahian has also called for the need to "prevent [Israel]



from joining other international organisations”: “Severing diplomatic relations with this regime, stopping the export of goods to the occupied territories and completely boycotting Israeli goods can be considered some practical measures to support Palestine,” he said in a post on X.

The Israeli army has returned a convoy of 14 trucks after the vehicles waited for three hours at a checkpoint in Wadi Gaza, the UN’s World Food Program has said. The convoy is the first of its kind since deliveries to the northern Gaza Strip were suspended on February 20. Israel has been blocking the flow of aid into northern Gaza for most of 2024, and has frequently attacked aid seekers who attempt to receive what little aid does make it to the north of the Strip.

The Geneva-based Euro-Mediterranean Human Rights Monitor said as Israel continues to commit genocide in the Gaza Strip and that the enclave’s elderly are dying at an alarmingly high rate. The main causes are bombing, starvation, dehydration, malnutrition and lack of access to medical care.

The organisation said in a statement that its team on the ground in Gaza “is recording nearly daily deaths among the elderly due to Israel’s systematic and pervasive crimes of starvation and treatment deprivation in the Gaza Strip, especially in Gaza City and the Strip’s northern regions”.

“The majority of these cases do not reach hospitals, which are only partially operational in northern Gaza because of the difficulty of access given the ongoing Israeli military attacks. Consequently, after dying at home, the elderly are buried either close to their residences or in makeshift graves dispersed across the Strip. There are currently more than 140 such cemeteries.”

A demonstrator with the Palestine Action group spray-painted and slashed a historic painting of Arthur Balfour, the British statesman who in 1917 pledged as foreign secretary to establish “a national home for the Jewish people” in Palestine.



The UK-based pro-Palestinian network published the video online. The incident happened in Trinity College at University of Cambridge, where Balfour graduated: “Written in 1917, Balfour’s declaration began the ethnic cleansing of Palestine by promising the land away – which the British never had the right to do,” it said.

Tens of thousands of pro-Palestine supporters marched in central London calling for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza. Demonstrators waved Palestinian flags and carried banners reading, “Stop the war on Gaza”, as they marched from Hyde Park Corner to the US Embassy.

Ben Jamal, the director of the Palestine Solidarity Campaign, said it was the 10th national march and was “unprecedented” in recent UK political history to see “this many people marching for this length of time”.

Singer Charlotte Church said she joined the protest to “show solidarity with the people of Palestine for all that they are suffering through”: “We’re all here because we cannot bear what we’re witnessing. We cannot bear to see civilians - children, women - slaughtered. And so we are here because our hearts are so full of love for the Palestinian people,” Church said.

Hundreds of pro-Palestinian protesters have shut down part of the San Francisco International Airport to demand an immediate ceasefire in Gaza and the end of all US military assistance to Israel. Demonstrators chanted “Free, free Palestine” while holding a banner that read “Stop Arming Israel” as they blocked access to security gates inside the international terminal in northern California. Protesters also halted traffic outside the departures entrance, blocking all lanes while marching in a circle with Palestinian flags.

As the Gaza war entered its sixth month, UN relief chief Martin Griffiths says these are facts that should “keep us all awake at night”. He said more than half a million people are on the brink of famine and children are dying of hunger while only half of planned aid missions for February were allowed in by Israel.



Lawlessness is hindering aid distribution, “last resort” aid deliveries like airdrops are becoming increasingly common, and more than 160 UN staff have been killed, Griffiths said. A group of top UN experts said in a statement that “international crimes continue to take place on a daily basis in the Gaza Strip” by the Israeli military.

The experts, including UN special rapporteurs on extrajudicial executions and torture, said the October 7 attack by armed Palestinians may have seen actions amounting to enforced disappearances and ill-treatment of captives.

They also said Israel’s actions since have resulted in the “deaths of tens of thousands of protected persons, including a large number of children, women and the elderly, which may amount to grave breaches of international humanitarian law and international human rights law, including war crimes and crimes against humanity”.

Their statement welcomed provisional rulings by the International Court of Justice (ICJ) for Israel to stop acts constituting genocide, but warned that “much more needs to be urgently done in order to effectively and measurably stop any further carnage in Gaza”. South Africa has asked the International Court of Justice (ICJ) to order additional emergency measures against Israel, which it says is breaching the measures already in place.

The South African presidency said the country has “approached the International Court of Justice (ICJ) with an urgent application for the provisional measures the court ordered on 26 January 2024 to be strengthened” to prevent famine in Gaza: “The urgent application has been necessitated by widespread starvation in Gaza, which has claimed the lives of at least 15 children in the past week alone, with the actual numbers believed to be much higher,” the presidency said in a statement.

Mary Lawlor, United Nations special rapporteur on human rights defenders, said no moral arguments exist that can justify the continued sale of weapons to Israel by states that respect the principle of the universality of human rights.



In an op-ed in The Irish Times, Lawlor said: “The international human rights architecture is creaking under the weight of the hypocrisy of states professing absolute support for a rules-based order yet continuing to facilitate this war by providing weapons to Israel to kill more innocent Palestinians.”

She called the Israeli onslaught on Gaza “a war on women and children”, who account for 70 percent of the more than 30,000 Palestinians dead, adding that human rights defenders have been explicitly targeted, including journalists, killed at work covering the conflict, while clearly visible in press vests and helmets. “This is also a war on journalists,” she said, and “a war against humanitarian personnel.”

Medical Aid for Palestinians and the International Rescue Committee provided new details of an Israeli air strike on a residential compound housing humanitarian workers and their families. The January attack wounded several team members despite coordinates being shared with the Israeli military, which offered six different explanations that “have not provided clarity” as to why it happened, a statement said.

“The variety of responses highlights a continued lack of transparency regarding what occurred. It is clear from this experience the Israeli military and government are either unable or unwilling to properly investigate this serious incident,” the groups said.

The statement called on Israel’s allies, including the US and UK, to launch “a full, independent and timebound investigation into the 18 January incident - and all reported attacks on deconflicted facilities and personnel”.

“As current suppliers of arms and munitions to Israel, governments such as the UK and the US have a particular responsibility to hold Israel accountable for this and other attacks on aid workers and civilians.”

The latest report by UN Office for Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) divulged an assessment of the Al-Ahli Hospital and the Sahaba Hospital in Gaza City. It said al-Ahli is “severely damaged” but has been lately able to facilitate access for some



patients after Israeli forces withdrew from parts of the Area. The facility can treat up to 50 patients and currently has 40 patients, but when over one hundred Palestinians were killed on 29 February while waiting for an aid distribution, it had to cope with approximately 200 patients. Medical staff are “in urgent need of specialised equipment, and especially, fuel.

The OCHA report said the Sahaba Hospital, which specialises in maternity care, is also “under-staffed and under-fuelled, with extreme shortages of oxygen and anaesthetics”.

The Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the largest Muslim civil rights and advocacy organisation in the US, said it carried out a poll on March 5, during the Super Tuesday presidential primary elections. The poll found that 72 percent of Muslim Super Tuesday voters were “disapproving” of Biden’s handling of the Israeli government’s war in Gaza.

The poll shows American Muslim voters are deeply concerned about the ongoing genocide in Gaza: “As November approaches, American Muslim voters are important political voices in key states, capable of deciding numerous races, including the presidency, and shaping the future of the nation”.

Muslim and Arab-American voters represent a key constituency for Biden that he will need to court if he hopes to get re-elected to a second term during the US presidential election in November.

The UN’s Relief and Works Agency for Palestinian refugees (UNRWA) said some of its employees were forced by the Israeli military to falsely state that the agency supports Hamas and that its staff participated in the October 7 attacks.

A report by the agency dated February 2024 said unidentified Palestinians, including several working for UNRWA, were detained and tortured by the Israeli military to make false statements.

UNRWA communications director Juliette Touma was quoted as saying it plans to hand over the 11-page report to agencies inside and outside the UN to document potential human rights abuses: “When the war comes to an end, there needs to be a series of inquiries to look into all violations of human rights,” she said.



Israel has been pushing to dismantle UNRWA based on its allegations that some employees took part in the October 7 attacks and the organisation works with Hamas.

“Agency staff members have been subject to threats and coercion by the Israeli authorities while in detention, and pressured to make false statements against the agency,” the report said.

The Palestinian Return Centre (PRC) submitted a report to the UN on the treatment of Palestinian children by Israeli forces in Gaza, the occupied West Bank and East Jerusalem.

The report said more than 12,000 Palestinian children have been killed in Gaza in attacks by Israeli forces since October 7, with many others facing amputations and life-changing injuries. Israeli forces “systematically” detain Palestinian children in the occupied West Bank, leading to the detention of at least 200 kids since the war in Gaza began. They’re often subjected to psychological and physical torture.

“The suffering of children in the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, must not fade into the background of the current conflict - it is part of it,” said the report. “Deliberately targeting and causing harm to civilians is considered a war crime”.

3. Human Loss and Material Damage

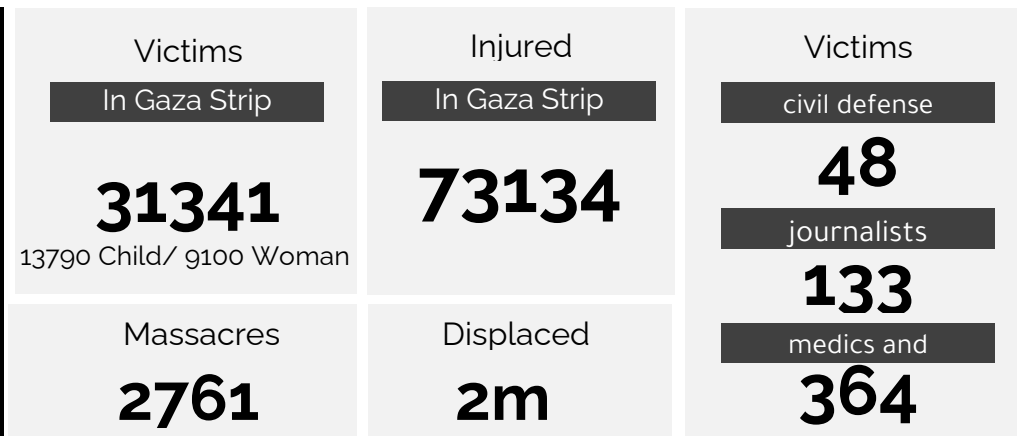
Israel’s onslaught on Gaza has been described as one of the most brutal military campaigns in modern history, with more than 31,341 people killed, including 13,790 children and 9,100 women. 73,134 people have been left injured and 7,000 are missing under the rubble of destroyed buildings. More than 2,761 massacres have been committed by the Israeli army in the period under examination.



More than 85% percent of Gaza's population are displaced and have been forced to flee after more than five months of the war. The list of victims includes 364 medics and paramedics, 48 civil defense staff members, and 133 journalists.

Israeli forces kidnapped and detained 269 medics and paramedics from the Gaza Strip along with 10 journalists.

Human Losses



Since the start of the war on Oct. 7, as many as 4,000 Palestinians have been arrested by Israel.

The Palestine Red Crescent said on X that 14 of its staff remain in Israeli detention, calling on the international community to pressure Israeli authorities to release them: "Their families and colleagues are deeply concerned for their safety, as there are reports of torture and humiliation based on testimonies from released colleagues", the post read.

Israeli rights group HaMoked said that as of March, Israel is imprisoning 9,077 Palestinians, including more than 3,500 held without charge in administrative detention. The data was provided by the Israel Prison Service: "Holding prisoners and detainees from the [occupied Palestinian territories] inside Israel constitutes a blatant violation of the Fourth Geneva Convention, prohibiting the transfer of prisoners and detainees outside the occupied territory, and also violates basic human rights enshrined, inter alia, in Israeli law," the organisation said.

According to the Palestinian Prisoners' Society, Gaza detainees are subject to forced disappearance as Israeli authorities are refusing to disclose any information related to their arrest: "The longer it takes to not know about their fate, the more our concern grows. This is especially in light of the testimonies that are surfacing about torture and executions carried out against



Gaza detainees since the ground invasion began,” it said. “We are not surprised by media reports that 27 Gaza detainees have died in detention, but rather constituted additional evidence of the level of horrific crimes carried out by the occupation.”

At least 32 hospitals and 53 health centres on the Strip have been rendered out of service. Over 155 healthcare facilities have been targeted by Israeli military. Israeli forces also destroyed 126 ambulances.

Around 60,000 pregnant women in the Gaza Strip suffer from dehydration, malnutrition and lack of proper health care; About 5,000 pregnant women in the Gaza Strip give birth every month in harsh, unsafe and unhealthy conditions as a result of bombing and displacement.

Israeli air and ground onslaughts totally destroyed 166 government facilities along with 100 schools and universities while partially damaging 305 schools and universities. 217 mosques and three churches were razed to the ground while 284 others sustained massive damage.

The Palestinian Ministry of Foreign Affairs said Ramadan in the Gaza Strip this year is “unlike the holy month in previous years or anywhere else in the world”, especially in light of the destruction of all aspects of life in the Gaza Strip, including dozens of mosques.

Nearly 70,000 housing units have been completely razed to the ground; 295,000 units have been partially damaged and made uninhabitable. Israeli attacks destroyed 200 historical sites.

Telecommunications have been partially or totally down in the Gaza Strip several times during the course of Israel's war on the territory, making life harder for Palestinians enduring bombardment and deprivation to receive potentially life-saving information and contact loved ones outside of the Strip. Israeli forces dropped more than 90,000 tons of explosives on the Gaza Strip.


The United Nations has reiterated that civilian infrastructure must be protected, as more than six months of heavy Israeli bombardment and assaults that have decimated vital infrastructure in Gaza.

At least 432 Palestinians have been killed in Israeli military raids across the West Bank since Oct. 7. Up to 4,700 people have been wounded. Israeli army incursions have led to the displacement of more than 3,013 Palestinians from their homes and the demolition of 637 structures.


Attacks on Palestinians by Israeli settlers across the West Bank have surged to new heights since October 7. The Israeli army has been regularly storming Palestinian towns in the West Bank amid an uptick in settler violence.
