INTRODUCTION

For the past 62 years, millions of Palestinians have been living as refugees in areas of the occupied Palestinian territory (OPT) and in surrounding host countries - mostly in Jordan, Lebanon and Syria. The UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) has described their plight as "by far the most protracted and largest of all refugee problems in the world today"

While there is much focus on the Israeli Palestinian conflict on a political level there is very little, if any, mention of the refugees and internally displaced Palestinians who comprise three quarters of the global Palestinian population. There is also very little attention given to the routine demolition and expulsion which continue to swell the number of refugees. The 7.1 Million Palestinian refugees face many difficult challenges which require greater attention from the international community.

This bulletin provides an update on the condition of Palestinian refugees around the world over the past month. It covers stories from the Occupied Territories, internally displaced Palestinians in Israel, UNRWA, host countries, Palestinians in the Diaspora and commentaries relating to the refugees.

1 ISRAEL and the OCCUPIED TERRITORIES

Palestinians are continually evicted from their homes in East Jerusalem. Since its occupation in 1967 Israel has boosted its Jewish population to the great detriment of Palestinians. It is estimated that 180,000 or more Palestinians have been evicted from their homes.

1.1 Israel: rabbis' ban on housing for non-Jews condemned

Amnesty International today condemned a religious ruling signed by dozens of Israel's municipal chief rabbis that bans the renting or sale of homes to non-Jews. While the ruling is not official government policy, the rabbis issuing it include the influential Shmuel Eliyahu, chief rabbi of Safed, and his counterparts in a number of other Israeli cities and municipalities, all of whom are essentially government employees..

1.2 Statement on the increase in house demolitions in the West Bank and East Jerusalem by Mr Maxwell Gaylard, the United Nations

Earlier today Maxwell Gaylard, the United Nations Humanitarian Coordinator for the occupied Palestinian territory, visited the site of a Palestinian home which had been demolished just twenty four hours earlier, following an order by the relevant authorities of the Government of Israel. In a statement Mr Gaylard said, "the destruction of this home and the displacement of these people raises serious concerns with regard to Israel's obligations under international law."

2 REFUGEES IN THE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES

Refugees are the most vulnerable within the occupied territory. Three quarters of Gaza's 1.7 million, who are still under siege, are refugees, and in the West Bank a quarter of the population are refugees

Demolitions and demolition orders continue. In the Gaza Strip, limited exports continue; wheat reserves remain low. Daily power cuts remain up to 6 hours. Cooking gas shortages continue.

3 UNRWA (United Nations Relief and Works Agency)

UNRWA (the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East) provides assistance, protection and advocacy for some 4.7 million registered Palestine refugees in Jordan, Lebanon, Syria and the occupied Palestinian territory, pending a solution to their plight.

UNRWA is funded almost entirely by voluntary contributions from UN member states.

3.1 Solution to Palestine refugees imperative for peace

UNRWA was established in 1949 under a General Assembly resolution that called upon the agency to assist and support Palestine refugees pending a just and lasting resolution of their plight.

As a temporary agency, the duration of whose mandate is tied to the resolution of the Palestine refugee situation, UNRWA looks forward to the day when its services will no longer be required, allowing it to fold its operations. The arrival of that day, however, is contingent upon a real peace process that bears tangible results for Palestine refugees in line with United Nations resolutions and with international law and practice.

3.5 Response to "Refugeeism" by Michael Bernstam

The essay published on your website, "Refugeeism" by Michael Bernstam contains a number of false statements and misrepresents many aspects of the work of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA).

UNRWA does not perpetuate refugee status. Rather, through its human development work, it empowers refugees to become self-reliant and productive members of the communities in which they live. Every year, UNRWA educates some 500,000 children in the occupied Palestinian territory (that is, the West Bank and Gaza) and in Jordan, Syria and Lebanon.

4 LEBANON

Lebanon's estimated 400,000 Palestinian refugees live in appalling social and economic conditions - most of them in crowded camps that lack essential infrastructure. In 2001, Parliament passed a law prohibiting Palestinians from owning property, a right they had for decades. Lebanese law also restricts their ability to work in many areas. In 2005, Lebanon eliminated a ban on Palestinians holding most clerical and technical positions, provided they obtain a temporary work permit from the Labour Ministry, but more than 20 high-level professions remain off-limits to Palestinians.

4.1 Belgium Donates 600,000 Euros to Help Palestinian Refugees

Belgium donated 600,000 euros (\$786,000) to help with relief for displaced Palestinian refugees in northern Lebanon, the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees said. The donation supplements Belgian assistance for reconstruction of the Nahr Al-Bared Palestinian refugee camp that was destroyed during combat between the Lebanese army and Fatah al-Islam militants in 2007, the agency said in an e-mailed statement today.

BEIRUT: Now in its tenth year and still no closer to achieving its goal, the Palestinian Right of Return Coalition vowed Monday to continue its fight for the right to return to Palestine, and not just for third-country resettlement.

The collection of international NGOs, advocating for the millions of displaced Palestinians across the region, is headed in the country by Palestinian human rights group A'idoun and operates under the joint slogan "Return is an Inalienable Right and Cannot be Nullified by the Passage of Time."

NAHR EL-BARED CAMP, Lebanon | The apartments are called "containers" or "barracks" and were built to be temporary housing for Palestinian refugees displaced by war more than three years ago. Some are made of concrete. Others are made of tin.

"We don't see the sun here," said Yazmine Khaleel, who has lived with her husband and four children in a one-room barrack since she fled the fighting. "They told me we would have nice temporary houses. It's only a container."

Before his murder in 1948, Lord Folke Bernadotte, the first UN mediator to the Arab-Israeli conflict, stated: "It would be an offence against the principles of elemental justice if these innocent [Palestinian] victims of the conflict were denied the right to return to their homes, while Jewish immigrants flow into Palestine." Lord Bernadotte paid for his candour with his life as Jewish militants assassinated him under the direction of Yitzhak Shamir, the man who would later become prime minister of Israel.
